"So, I spent some time at a Food Bank today and spoke to the people getting food. Here are some things I learned from those in need:

- 1. Everyone donates Kraft Mac and Cheese in the box. They can rarely use it because it needs milk and butter which is hard to get from food banks.
- 2. Boxed milk is a treasure as kids need it for the cereal that they get a lot of.
- 3. Everyone donates pasta and sauce.
- 4. They cannot eat the canned items unless they have a can opener. Look for pop tops.
- 5. Oil is a luxury but needed for Rice-A-Roni which they get a lot of.
- 6. Spices, salt and pepper would be a real Christmas gift.

- 8. Sugar and Flour are treats.
- 9. They fawn over fresh produce donated by farmers and grocery stores.
- 10. Seeds are cool in the springtime because growing can be easy for some.

Invite a friend to join us. Be sure to bring your Bible with you.


From the Music Director




Lord of Life Literary Society (Book Club)

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD NEWS

National Collection Week (NCW) is the week of November 15th-22nd. Lord of Life has the opportunity to serve as the Central Drop-Off Center for the Southeast Region for the 7th year! Of course this means that volunteers will be needed. Please check your schedules and consider signing up to serve in this wonderful ministry which reaches out way beyond our church walls to places most of us could only imagine.

Just as we did last year, we will follow a "Curbside Drop-off Model" presented by Samaritans Purse. Volunteers are needed to serve in the following positions: greeter, host, unloader and cartonizer. Each has their own responsibilities which provide for social distancing. Additionally once all the cartons are packed, additional volunteers will be needed to load them on a 28-foot trailer (which will be parked along the fence of our playground). Please note that PPE (personal protective equipment) will be made available and worn by all volunteers while serving. Lord of Life will be open the following hours for others in our local community to drop off their shoeboxes during NCW:


From the Pastor's Desk.

"For Everything There is a Season"

This November sees the end of the current Church Year and the beginning of the next. The current year ends with "Christ the King Sunday," November 21st. The new Church Year begins Sunday, November 28th, four Sundays before Christmas, with the "First Sunday in Advent." As you may know, the Church Year is a cycle of Sunday scripture readings and worship concentrations. The scripture readings are set in a three-year series. This allows us to focus on the Gospel of Matthew in Year A, the Gospel of Mark in Year B, and the Gospel of Luke in Year C before repeating it all again. Over the three years we get a balanced and thorough exploration of the Gospels, as well as readings from the Old and New Testaments. Anyone notice there is not a year for the Gospel of John? We get a fair share of John mixed in every year. Just as the natural year has seasons moving from Spring through Winter and back to Spring again, so the Church Year has its own seasons. Can you name them? Here they are (out of order). Advent – Lent – Epiphany – Christmas – Pentecost – Easter. See if you can put them in their proper order: you can check your answer at the end of this article. Don't peek. Why, through its history, would the Church have developed this annual cycle of Seasons? Think again of the natural seasons. Each has its own focus and opportunities. The beauty of new growth in Spring, birds busy with their nests while we may grab the golf clubs or our gardening tools, file our taxes. Summer brings crops, outdoor recreation, vacations. Fall, lots of leaves to rake or let be, hunting season, back to school. Winter we get out the skis, snow mobiles and snow blowers, while the earth gets a much-needed rest. Likewise, the Seasons of the Church Year, from Advent through Easter, lead us on a journey through Christ's promised return followed by his earthly life as it unfolds from birth through ministry, death, resurrection, and ascension. With Pentecost we then delve into the life of the Church and discipleship. This seasonal cycle to the Church Year is, by the way, a very good argument for regular attendance at worship, in-person or online. Imagine going about our business Fall through Spring but somehow sleeping through the whole Summer. That would be a tremendous loss. So, with worship: each Sunday builds on the next. Why? So that our trust in Jesus may grow, be our stronghold in life's crisis, our joy in life's blessings and mature through the years like an oak against which we may rest and find peace. Peace in the divine word of forgiveness of sin and the promise of eternal life. For this Jesus died and rose. For us Jesus died and rose. For you Jesus died and rose. But while an oak will one day fall, the love of God in Christ Jesus is "from everlasting to everlasting." Sure, and certain in every season. The Seasons of the Church Year in order: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost.
